Assistant Professor in Counselor Education (Pending approval)

The Counselor Education Department at Fairfield University is seeking an assistant professor with an emphasis in School Counseling beginning Fall 2016. For this tenure-track faculty position we are looking for someone who is an enthusiastic teacher, a dedicated scholar, willing to contributing to the accreditation process, and eager to actively participate as a team player in the department, school, and University communities. This individual will also have an established record of contribution to the counseling profession at the state, regional, and/or national levels.

The successful candidate will be one who meets the qualifications to teach in a CACREP-accredited program and one who embodies a commitment to collaboration and the mission and ideals of a Jesuit University. This person will bring evidence of successful counseling experience in school settings and licensure as a practicing counselor. In addition, this individual will convey enthusiasm for the counseling profession and a desire to instill a strong counselor identity in our students. This individual must be willing and able to work with those from socially, culturally, and economically diverse communities and will display a commitment to social justice.

Fairfield University is a Jesuit, Catholic institution, consistently ranked as a top comprehensive university in New England and located in the scenic shoreline community of Fairfield, CT, one hour from New York City along Long Island Sound. Our five colleges and professional schools enroll approximately 3,500 undergraduate and 1,200 graduate students. We aim to develop intellectual potential and foster ethical and religious values in the Jesuit tradition, which includes an explicit commitment to religious and cultural pluralism.
